Major Plot Summary

It's a hot summer on Amity Island, a small community whose main business is its beaches. When new Sheriff Martin Brody discovers the remains of a shark attack victim, his first inclination is to close the beaches to swimmers. This doesn't sit well with Mayor Larry Vaughn and several of the local businessmen. Brody backs down to his regret as that weekend a young boy is killed by the predator. The dead boy's mother puts out a bounty on the shark and Amity is soon swamped with amateur hunters and fisherman hoping to cash in on the reward. A local fisherman with much experience hunting sharks, Quint, offers to hunt down the creature for a hefty fee. Soon Quint, Brody and Matt Hooper from the Oceanographic Institute are at sea hunting the Great White shark. Inane Trivia

Several decades after the release of Jaws (1975), <u>Lee Fierro</u>, who played Mrs. Kintner, walked into a seafood restaurant and noticed that the menu had an "Alex Kintner Sandwich." She commented that she had played his mother so many years ago; the owner of the restaurant ran out to meet her, and he was none other than <u>Jeffrey Voorhees</u>, who had played her son. They had not seen each other since the original movie shoot.

When composer <u>John Williams</u> originally played the score for director <u>Steven Spielberg</u>, Spielberg laughed and said, "That's funny, John, really; but what did you really have in mind for the theme of <u>Jaws</u> (1975)?" Spielberg later stated that without Williams's score, the movie would only have been half as successful and according to Williams, it jump started his career.

Robert Shaw could not stand Richard Dreyfuss and the two argued all the time, which resulted in some good tension between Hooper and Quinn.

According to writer <u>Carl Gottlieb</u>, the line, "You're gonna need a bigger boat," was not scripted, but was ad-libbed by <u>Roy Scheider</u>.

The main reason the shark was barely seen was because it did not work often. Ended up increasing the suspense
